

# First two B.A. courses set to begin at WPCC

The first classes in Western Carolina University's Community Oriented Regional Education program will begin next week at Western Piedmont Community College.

Two courses will be offered in the program during spring semester. Registration for both courses will be held Monday from 6 to 8 p.m. in the auditorium at Western Piedmont.

The Community Oriented Regional Education program is a cooperative arrangement among Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute, Catawba Valley Technical Institute,

Wilkes Community College, Western Piedmont, and WCU.

The program is designed for persons who hold the associate of applied science degree in business or engineering technology.

It provides coursework leading to the bachelor of science in business administration degree with a concentration in general management or the bachelor of science degree in industrial technology with a concentration in industrial supervision.

An arts and sciences interdisciplinary course — ASI 311, The Classical Ages of Greece and Rome — will meet Tuesday from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. beginning Jan. 10. The upper-division course, which applies toward general education requirements, will be taught by Dr. Ellerd M. Hulbert, head of the WCU Department of History.

A native of Hartford, Conn., Dr. Hulbert is a graduate of Trinity College there. He holds the master's degree from Yale University and the Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago, and has twice been awarded teachers grants from the Danforth Foundation. He joined the WCU faculty in 1970.

Management 300, Principles of management, will meet Thursdays from 6:30 to 9:30 beginning Jan. 12, with Dr. Howard R. Harlow as the instructor.

Dr. Harlow, WCU associate professor of management, holds bachelor's and MBA degrees from Indiana University and the Ph.D. from the University Nebraska. A specialist in small business and management development, Dr. Harlow serves as director of management development programs for the WCU School of Business.
