Dr. Stallworth Outlines Community College Plan

Dr. Herbert F. Stallworth, president of the Western Piedmont Community College, told members of the Morganton Woman's Club last night that the Western Piedmont College will be open to all. "Just because you were born without a trade is no reason to remain that way," he said. The new college, expected to open its doors in the fall of 1966, will offer courses for everyone, on the college parallel; technical, vocational, cultural, and vocational refresher courses for adults.

Mrs. E. O. Whitley, president, presided, and Dr. Stallworth was introduced by Mrs. Alvin Hyder.

The college president gave an outline of the development of the college and what it is hoped it will be and what it will mean to the community. He said that the philosophy behind the movement is: Don't Be Satisfied. The purpose is to help attain a goal — to lift us out of our environment."

The college is expected to be open a full day from 7:30 p.m. There will be classes for everyone. Anyone may attend (the college level classes) who has a high school diploma or a qualifying certificate. The two year college will be under the control of the State Board of Education.

"The cost will be kept within reach of all. It is hoped that the cost per term will be approximately \$60 with no extra fees, excepting the purchase of your own books. Only the most essential tools to the particular course will be required," Dr. Stallworth said.

The method to be used will be independent study under supervision. A library will be a learning center housing all tools for all courses, which will be available for research. It is expected that closed circuit TV and video tape will be used.

A committee now is in the planning stage to find an overall picture of what is wanted. "We hope to have the college open for the fall term in 1966," the president said.

A question and answer period followed the talk.
